A Short Message From Archbishop Anthony Fisher OP

Dear Fellow Priests and Deacons My fraternal greetings to you all!

I'm looking forward to our next clergy conference this month, which will give us all a chance to reconnect before Easter. The first two sessions will be focused on unpacking the Archdiocesan Mission Plan, Go Make Disciples, and the final session will be with Dr Robbie Lloyd. Dr Robbie Lloyd will focus on informing and supporting clergy in caring for their own mental health and wellbeing, so they can enjoy their work and be best able to care for others. It will be a great day, I hope to see you all there!

This month we also celebrate the Feast of St. Joseph, the adopted father of Our Lord. It's fitting that we should celebrate his feast day so close to Easter, the feast on which the Son for to whom he cared came into His own glory as the Risen Lord. St. Joseph was a craftsman who belonged to a "working world," which appreciated and respected human work; indeed, Jesus' parables on the kingdom of God constantly refer to human work: that of shepherd, farmer, doctor, sower, householder, servant, steward, fisher, merchant, labourer, mother; they compare the apostolate to the manual work of harvesters, fishermen, or scholars.

Work, then, has been taken up into the mystery of the Incarnation, and redeemed in a special way; at the workbench where he plied his trade together with Jesus, Joseph brought human work closer to the mystery of the Redemption.

Speaking of the Redemption returns us to Easter. Last year's Easter was a very unusual one, with the state entering into Lockdown at the beginning of Holy Week – truly a Way of the Cross for those of us who look forward to this time as the pinnacle of our faith. When Christmas came, it seemed we would be able to come together again, but it was not to be.

Thank you to Deacon Paul Naggar



After twenty-four years of service as a permanent deacon, Deacon Paul Naggar will soon retire from his parish duties. We are deeply grateful for Deacon Paul's remarkable legacy and contribution, and we pray that he will enjoy a peaceful and joyful retirement with his wife, Julianne.

Paul Naggar was born in Cairo, Egypt, to committed Catholic parents. He was educated by the De La Salle Brothers, and later worked in the Aviation Industry. In 1965, as a young man, Paul migrated to Australia with his parents, and the family settled in Liverpool. Paul and his wife Julianne are celebrating their Golden Wedding Anniversary this year, and they are blessed with two children and one grandchild. Paul worked in the telecommunication industry for 35 years, including involvement with international broadcasting of the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

On 23 August 1997, Paul was ordained by His Eminence Cardinal Edward Clancy as a permanent deacon, the first in the Archdiocese of Sydney. The path to diaconal ordination had presented many challenges for Paul, especially given that he was a trailblazing figure in this area. He pursued his vocation with faithfulness and perseverance throughout his six years of formation, enrolling in theological studies at the Catholic Institute of Sydney in 1992, and working under the supervision of three difference vocation directors.

Paul was appointed as Deacon of the Parish of All Saints, Liverpool following his ordination in 1997. He served faithfully at Liverpool for 13 years, before being appointed as Deacon of Carnes Hill Parish in 2010, Bossley Park from 2012-2015, Moorebank from 2015-2020, and Austral from 2020 - present.

Deacon Paul Naggar has been a pioneering figure as the Archdiocese's first permanent deacon. He has served with great generosity and dedication, and as a husband, father, and successful professional he has brought a wealth of wisdom and life experience to his diaconal vocation. His ministry has touched many families in Sydney, through the weddings and baptisms which he has celebrated, the many couples whom he has prepared for marriage, and through the ongoing pastoral care and preaching which Paul has contributed in his parish appointments spanning three decades.

The Archdiocese is blessed to now have fourteen ordained permanent deacons serving in our parishes. For the expansion and the wonderful fruits of the permanent diaconate in Sydney, we owe much to Deacon Paul—for his courage in being the first to pursue this path, and for his exemplary service and commitment as a deacon of Jesus Christ.

IMPORTANT MATTERS

Making your Will and Appointing a Legal Guardian

It can become quite awkward if, when a priest dies, we do not who are your executors. For these reasons, I urge you both to include a priest among your executors and to lodge a copy of your will with the Chancery. I must emphasise that this is not to give me or the Chancery information about your assets etc. It is simply to ensure that, when you die, we know whom to contact and your wishes about your funeral can be known by a priest of your choosing who will be able to assist with funeral arrangements, and also assist with the probate process.

In addition to making a Will, it is also important that we appoint someone with Power of Attorney to manage our financial affairs, and a Guardian, i.e. someone who is able to make medical decisions for us — in case we are debilitated by accident or illness and unable to make our own decisions.

To assist in preparing your Will, **attached** are a wills checklist and a statement of assets proforma. An information document is **also attached** to assist with the facilitation of Power of Attorney and Guardianship arrangements

The idea of these documents is threefold:

1. If you comprehensively complete the forms, this makes preparation of a Will quicker and easier.

- 2. The forms also assist in ensuring that all assets and relevant matters are considered and that your intentions will be honoured.
- The information also assists with deciding about allowing someone else to make decisions on your behalf should you be unable to make such decisions for yourself

The Archdiocese and the Clergy Remuneration System recognise the importance of ensuring that you have these documents prepared and have agreed to help with the future costs of preparation of your Wills and other estate documentation (Power of Attorney/appointment of a Guardian).

Chancery and CRS will each contribute \$150 plus GST per priest per will and \$100 plus GST for the costs of preparing the other documents [totalling a maximum combined contribution by Chancery/CRS of \$500 plus GST per priest for the suite of documents]. Individual priests will be expected to meet any additional costs. **Reimbursement will be provided to priests on submission of a receipt** to Chancery and an appropriate contribution will be subsequently requested from the CRS.

Marriage Formalities

Please note the following important rules:

- Permission for a Mixed Marriage and/or Dispensation for Disparity of Worship can only be granted by the Archbishop or his delegate. Thanks to all who are using our current email system, which is working very efficiently. We request celebrants to scan and email the Pink form to dispensations@sydneycatholic.org (and only to mail the forms if necessary).
- 2. When celebrating a marriage outside of a Parish church (e.g. in a school chapel or by exception 'outside a sacred space') all paperwork should be left at the Parish of the place where the marriage occurred. The Parish should record the marriage in both the Marriage Register (Liber Matrimoniorum) and in PACS. The paperwork should then be filed in the Parish Archives.
- When celebrating a wedding outside of one's diocese/ archdiocese, we all require specific delegation from the Bishop of the place of marriage.

National Mass -Feast of Our Lady Help of Christians 24 May 2021

The plans for these celebrations include a National Mass on the Feast of Our Lady Help of Christians. Each diocesan Cathedral will celebrate this Mass and many of the local



parishes will also celebrate Mass for their local Primary school students, parents and parishioners (depending on COVID restrictions at the time). The Mass from our Cathedral will be live streamed so that students, staff, families and parishioners who cannot attend a Mass can participate in the National Mass via the live stream.

It is hoped that every parish in Sydney will also celebrate a Mass at 10.30am on 24 May to coincide with the Mass at St Mary's Cathedral. Sydney Catholic Schools will be asking the local school Principals to discuss this with you in the coming weeks. Your support of the celebrations throughout the year will be very important. Each school will be sent a fence banner to display for the year. Prayer cards for every student and staff member will be sent to schools this month.

The National Launch of these celebrations will be held on 18 February, at this time I will launch a Pastoral Letter on Catholic Education "200 years young" from the Bishops of Australia. This event will be live streamed nationally.

Parish Renewal Team Implementation of Go Make Disciples

Over the past month, the Parish Renewal Team of the Sydney Centre for Evangelisation has engaged with a number of communities and individuals seeking to explore how parish renewal is supported by the Archdiocesan Mission Plan, Go Make Disciples.

Leading Renewal

In February a group of clergy and seminarians gathered to participate in an online workshop on leadership which was designed to support our clergy as leaders of parish renewal. The workshop was a collaboration with the Committee for the Ongoing Formation of Clergy, and was led



by Fr James Mallon. Fr Mallon focused on the vital role of the parish priest in leading renewal, tips for how to lead, and effective leadership in the current pastoral landscape. Fr Mallon's complete talk and highlights of the talk will be available in coming weeks; details in the next Ad Clerum.

Forming our future priests

In mid-February the Parish Renewal Team was invited by the Rector of the Seminary of the Good Shepherd to provide a week of formation to the third and fourth year seminarians. The week was focused on leading renewal and allowed the seminarians to delve deeply into what it means to lead as well and how to effectively respond to the changing pastoral landscape.

Opening up personal and parish renewal through the Lenten Companion

In order to support you in engaging your parishioners in parish renewal, our team produced and distributed a Lenten Companion, Receive the Grace to Go Make Disciples, which presented a practical opportunity for parishioners to prayerfully contemplate the foundations of personal and parish renewal which are at the heart of the mission plan. The Lenten Companion was received very warmly: requests for extra copies exhausted our stock in the first week of Lent; the Companion has been translated by the Chinese community for their use; 45 Faith Educators recently attended a workshop with our team on how to run a Lenten group using the resource; and Catholics from across the Archdiocese having been zooming into a weekly online Lenten group with Fr Noel Custodio.

Beginning the renewal journey

Over the past month the Parish Renewal Team has been invited to engage with a number of communities seeking spiritual renewal through building parish foundations which help people to be called and formed as disciples, as discussed in our mission plan; these have includes the Parishes of St Anne's Bondi Beach and St Patrick's Bondi, Our Lady of the Rosary at Fairfield, St Mark's Drummoyne, and the Chinese Catholic Community. Over a dozen parishes are currently working with the team to explore and implement invitational programs that can help support their mission *ad gentes*. It's been a joy to be with these communities at the beginning of this journey.

Engaging parishioners in parish renewal

There are a number of practical opportunities coming up to explore the plan and engage your parishioners in parish renewal:

 On 16 March, the Communications Team in the Sydney Centre for Evangelisation to offered a Parish Communication in the Digital Age workshop to help strengthen the foundations of community and evangelisation in your parish.

- Throughout June and July the Parish Renewal Team and the Dominican Sisters of St Cecilia will be offering retreats on discipleship and mission. These retreats are being provided as a resource you can offer your parishioners to receive spiritual formation on being called and sent as a disciple of Jesus. Details in the next Ad Clerum.
- In coming months the Parish Renewal Team will also be offering a formation series on leadership. This series is intended to provide formation to those lay leaders who assist you such as your staff, Parish Pastoral Council, parish finance committee, and leaders of ministries. Details in the next Ad Clerum.

The team is looking forward to seeing you at the upcoming Clergy Conference on 23 March 2021.

PLENARY COUNCIL

Reflection Time for Members

On February 20 the delegated Members of the Plenary Council who are domiciled in Sydney gathered at Villa Maria Hunters Hill to engage in prayerful reflection in preparation for their role as delegates to the Council.



Fr Aloysius Rego, a Discalced Carmelite, skilfully lead the group in the morning session through the meaning of the cross in the lives of Christians. He drew from the writings of Teresa of Avila and John of the Cross and made them relevant to those present. Members were asked to reflect on questions inspired by saints such as "Saint Teresa of Avila" who told us the "the measure of being willing to bear a small or large cross is love". Delegates were asked:

"How open and willing are you to invest yourself in the Plenary Council?"

"What are the attitudes, fears, compromises in yourself that prevent you from fully embracing the cross of discipleship as you participate in the Plenary Council?"

The afternoon session was a reflection on Listening and Fr. Rego provided excellent examples of the need to listen as a service to others. Quoting Lawrence Freeman, he argued that "the point of dialogue with those you love and respect is not to convince them but to listen. The greatest changes are wrought through listening. This is what Mary did...". The need for listening is of greater service than speaking. All too often the Church has assumed that the Spirit will lead us to the complete truth (Jn16:13). This has led to the assumption that we have the truth and have no need to listen to dissident or marginalised voices. These were the ones to whom Jesus listened and with whom He was involved.

Members expressed their appreciation of the opportunity to come together for this time of reflection.

Instrumentum Laboris

The Instrumentum Laboris (working document) now titled "Continuing our Journey" has been sent out and will be available for use within parishes. It is available on the Plenary Council Website and is accompanied by a reflection guide. It is anticipated that parishes will be involved in reflection on this document using the reflection guide. We anticipate reengaging with the ambassadors and organising monthly reflection groups in the parishes after Pentecost.

There are a series of podcasts available on the Plenary Council website of 10-13 minutes designed to engage the whole Catholic community in the process as it is a process intended to engage the whole church.

Assembly 1-Multi modal platform

The First Assembly will be held from October 3 to October 9, 2021 and the second assembly will be face to face in Sydney from July 4 to July 9, 2022. In preparation for the Assemblies a National Conference Director, Danielle, has been appointed to work with the local event coordinators in each hub.

Regional hubs will be formed so that Covid requirements can be adhered to and as a precaution if there should be another outbreak. The bishops are to determine the makeup and size of the hubs in their Provincial meetings in March. The hubs in NSW and Victoria will include the Eastern churches, Personal Prelatures, Militiary Ordinariate, church agencies and leaders from religious congregations.

In preparation for the Assembly there will be a five-month period of prayer for the success of the Assembly. It is hoped that this could be launched on Pentecost Sunday.

Formation for delegates (now known as members) has been arranged by the National Team with a choice of four dates in June and July. We anticipate that a further retreat will be held for our Sydney delegates in September.

Next steps

The Archdiocese of Sydney will arrange a short retreat for parish ambassadors and others who assisted in the earlier phases of the Plenary Council process as we move into this new phase of preparation.

Information will be provided to parishes regarding the reengagement in the Plenary process.

When the Plenary prayers are revitalised parishes should encourage people to use them.

- Supply payments to assist with Annual, Sabbatical and Long Service Leave will be reintroduced for all parishes from 1 January 2021.
- Sabbatical and Long Service Leave will be paid at the same rate as the (increased) monthly stipend.

Can you celebrate Mass in another language?

We often have calls asking for priests who can say Mass or minister to people in a foreign language outside those languages that are supplied by our foreign chaplains.

This may be Mass but it also includes visiting the sick, the Last Rites, Marriage Preparation, and general pastoral care.

From CCD **SPECIAL RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (SRE)**

Restrictions eased

NSW Education released updated SRE COVID-safe advice (9 March) in line with state-wide easing of restrictions. Chancery and CCD has advised Parish clergy and catechist coordinators. Summary:

- Upon arrival in schools, complete COVID-safe declaration sign-in procedures
- No limit on number of SRE teachers per class/group (helpers/observers are permitted); no limit on class sizes.
- SRE teachers, support staff and parents to maintain physical distance from each other (1.5 metres).
- Singing and/or chanting activities allowed (5 metres between singers and those they are facing, where practicable). Any questions regarding this update, please contact your parish's CCD Faith Education Officer.

Stephen's story

Eleven year old Steven is an active young man who has a permanent foster care family who love and care for him. Stephen needs a part-time carer who can become an important part of his support network, so we are looking for someone who is understanding and will not give up when things get tough.

Sophie's story

Ten year old Sophie loves gymnastics and playing soccer. Sophie needs a permanent place to call home with a person or family who will support her to stay in contact with her siblings and family. She also needs someone who will guide her through high school and into young adulthood.

To help respond to the needs Stephen, Sophie and other children and young people like them, Family Spirit hold regular information sessions designed for individuals or couples who are interested in finding out about becoming foster carers.

Through the process they learn about social justice and that people with intellectual disabilities are not different, and what they invest into the day, they will receive back tenfold.

The Solidarity program moves people living with i ntellectual disabilities from the margins of our communities to making a home in the hearts of students. In encountering each other, the students are deeply affected by the enthusiastic welcome and kindness they receive at Centacare from the supported employees, and the supported employees feel they have something of value to offer the students. This mutuality brings mission to life in a very real and practical way for school communities.

Teachers that have been recently involved from St Joseph's College Hunters Hill say that their school has been proud to have been part of the program.

Through Catholic Social Teaching principles like dignity, common good and solidarity, we are really called by Christ to deeply care for those most vulnerable in our community.

Throughout the program students grow and learn these skills that will set them up well for having a heart for others and promoting social justice throughout their lives.

Students not only learn leadership skills, but also how to engage with new people, increasing their ability to ask questions and interact with people from all walks of life.

Safeguarding

Child Protection Reporting Obligations

It has officially been 1 year since the NSW Government strengthened Child Protection Reporting Obligations such as the Reportable Conduct Scheme and Mandatory Reporting. A lot has happened in the past year so we just wanted to give you a friendly reminder about your obligations under the Reportable Conduct Scheme as a Mandatory Reporter.

Mandatory Reporting

Just a reminder that in March 2020 amendments to the Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998 commenced to expand mandatory reporter groups. These amendments are part of the NSW Government's response to recommendations made by the Royal Commission. Mandatory reporting is a legislative requirement to make a report to certain government authorities, in NSW, mandatory reporting is primarily regulated by sections 27 and 27A of the Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998. Mandatory reporter groups in NSW have been expanded to include:

- Persons in religious ministry or persons providing religion-based activities to children (e.g. minster of religion, priest, deacon, pastor, rabbi, religious brother or sister)
- Registered psychologists providing a professional service as a psychologist.

What does this mean for the Archdiocese of Sydney?

This means that any of our clergy, deacons, religious brothers and religious sisters are legally required to make a report when they have reasonable grounds to suspect that a child is at risk of significant harm. It also means that volunteers and paid employees in Agencies and Parishes of the Archdiocese who provide activities to children such as Children's Liturgy, Youth Ministry groups, Sacramental programs are also legally required to make a report when they have reasonable grounds to suspect that a child is at risk of significant harm. A reporter has a duty to report, as soon as practicable, the name or a description of the child and the grounds for suspecting that the child is at risk of significant harm.

What is Risk of Significant Harm?

Risk of significant harm is any one or more of the following circumstances

- The child's or young person's basic physical or psychological needs are not being met or are at risk of not being met,
- The parents or other caregivers have not arranged and are unable or unwilling to arrange for the child or young person to receive necessary medical care
- c. The child or young person has been, or is at risk of being, physically or sexually abused or ill-treated
- d. The child or young person is living in a household where there have been incidents of domestic violence and, as a consequence, the child or young person is at



- risk of serious physical or psychological harm,
- e. A parent or other caregiver has behaved in such a way towards the child or young person that the child or young person has suffered or is at risk of suffering serious psychological harm.

How to make a report?

Before making a report to the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ), please contact the Safeguarding Office on **02 9390 5810**. The Safeguarding Office will help you determine whether the report needs to be made directly to the DCJ or another government authority. Reports to the DCJ are made by calling the NSW Child Protection Helpline on **132 111**.

Reportable Conduct Scheme

From 1 March 2020, the Children's Guardian Reportable Conduct Scheme commencee under the Children's Guardian Act 2019, the scheme provides a framework for the oversight of how organisations respond to reportable allegations and reportable convictions. Religious bodies are required to notify the Office of the Children's Guardian about reportable allegations and convictions against employees that arise in the course of their work both in and outside the organisation.

Who is an employee?

Under the Children's Guardian Act 2019 an employee of an entity includes:

- An individual employed by, or in the entity
- A volunteer providing services to children
- A contractor engaged directly by the entity (or third party) where the contractor holds, or is required to hold, a
 Working With Children Check for the purposes of their
 work with the entity
- A person engaged by a religious body where that person holds or is required to hold a Working with Children
 Check for the purposes of their work with the religious body.

Reportable allegation & reportable conviction?

When a employer such as Parish Priest, Administrator or Agency Head becomes aware of a reportable allegation (reportable conduct) or a reportable conviction such as:

- a. A sexual offence
- b. Sexual misconduct
- c. III-treatment of a child
- d. Neglect of a child

- e. An assault again a child
- f. An offence under s43B (failure to protect) or s316A (failure to report) of the Crimes Act 1990
- g. Behaviour that causes significant emotional or psychological harm to a child

Employers must notify the Safeguarding and Ministerial Integrity Office on **02 9390 5810** as soon as they become aware of reportable allegations or reportable convictions. The Safeguarding Office has just seven business days to notify the Office of the Children's Guardian and commence an investigation into the reportable allegations and/or reportable convictions.
